

NEEDLES & HOOKS AT THE READY!!

The local hospitals are looking for people to help knit or crotchet dementia blankets and bonding squares to give to patients.

Currently there are lots of patients in the hospitals with dementia, and blankets created for these patients need to be brightly coloured so they can identify their beds. If possible blankets need to be larger than lap size, ideally 36 inches by 36 inches.

The Neonatal ward require bonding squares, which are around 5inches square and if crocheted they need to be tightly stitched so there are no little holes for tiny fingers to get stuck in. They also need knitted cardigans for the babies ideally in pastel colours, blue, white and pink please. No Yellow please. Must be long sleeved with buttons for babies weighing 4lbs and upwards.Finished creations can be passed to Gill Hardman or Fiona Barraclough at the Place of Welcome groups.

Blanket for dementia patients

Double knitting wool (not fluffy) N0.8 or 9 needles

Cast on 2or 3 stitches

First Row

Slip first stitch then knit into front & back of second stitch of every row. Carry on until you have 42 stitches on the needle.

Knit one row without increase.

Then slip first stitch & knit two together at the beginning of every row.

Decrease until only one stitch is left.

36 squares are needed to make a blanket.

No need to join them together if you do not wish to do so.

We have ladies who will willingly crochet or sew this part of the process.

Please check with us via other means and never click the links. There are a lot of phishing emails around currently that we cannot do anything to stop. **Please be careful!**

What are the key signs of a phishing email?

The most common indicators of a phishing attempt usually involve tone, grammar and urgency in an email message and subject line.

Major warning signs in an email are:

- An unfamiliar greeting
- Grammar errors and misspelled words
- Email addresses and domain names that don't match
- Unusual content or request these often involve a transfer of funds or request for login credentials
- Urgency ACT NOW, IMMEDIATE ACTION REQUIRED
- Threats LAST WARNING, ACCOUNT SUSPENSION PENDING
- Suspicious attachments

This month.....Drug Offences.

Drug misuse harms the health and wellbeing of too many people. There are several different criminal offences which restrict the supply and use of harmful substances. It is illegal to possess, supply and produce controlled drugs. It is also illegal to import or export drugs, or to allow your premises to be used for drug production. Controlled drugs fall into three different categories, Class A, B or C, according to their danger or how harmful they are. The sentences for drug offences are different for each class of drugs. Spring has sprung, time to think about

Getting into the garden this month? Many people don't secure their shed or garage in the same way they do their homes - often using an easy-to-break lock or padlock to protect valuable contents such as a car, bike or lawnmower.

An opportunistic burglar will try a shed or garage first because they can find the tools they need to break into the main house. First off, check that your insurance



covers the contents of your shed or outbuildings from theft.



Think like a thief! Take a look at your shed and consider how you would break in. It's worth having a good padlock on the door with no exposed screws. Pay attention to hinges, as these are sometimes easily removable. If you have windows then these could be vulnerable unless they're secured with wire mesh or grills. And keep it locked at all times.

Remember! Alarm it, Lock it, hide it or mark it.

Eco Tip - Let it grow this #NoMowMay.

It's just over a month until Plantlife's #NoMowMay and we'd love as many UK churches and households as possible to ... give lawnmowers a month off! You might be surprised by what germinates in your lawn or church grounds by letting things grow. Clover seeds may already be present (they used to be in packets of lawn seed) and other seeds get blown in, or dropped by birds. Over the month (or two if you #LetItBloomJune), plants that have been lying dormant have a chance to grow, bloom and make some pollinators happy!



Wild Daffodils

At this time of year, the yellow trumpets of daffodils brighten up even the dullest spring day. Most of what we see are planted garden varieties, but a real treat is to find wild daffodils *(Narcissus pseudonarcissus)*.



Once widespread, the wild daffodil is now much rarer, having mysteriously declined during the 19th century. It now has a disjointed distribution – for instance it is found mainly in south Devon, pockets of the Black Mountains in Wales, stretches of the Gloucestershire-Herefordshire border country, the Sussex Weald, Farndale in Yorkshire, and the Lake District. Elsewhere, even in suitable habitat, it only occurs in small patches, many miles apart. For example, in churchyards. The wild daffodil's status as a popular flower was particularly celebrated in the area around Newent, Dymock and Ledbury on the Gloucestershire-Herefordshire border which acquired the nickname of 'The Golden Triangle.' In the 1930s the Great Western Railway ran 'Daffodil Specials', from London

for weekend tourists to walk amongst the 'golden tides' and to buy fresh bunches at garden gates. Many farmers and orchard-owners used to have them as a cash-crop, harvested on a 'Pick Your Own' basis. At the end of April, the meadows went back to their function of growing hay or fruit.

A 1930's guide to a village in the Golden Triangle wrote: They are picked by the local women and children and were sold to an agent, who sends them to South Wales, where they find a ready sale for Mothering Sunday and also for Palm Sunday, for many places the old (Welsh) custom of 'flowering the graves' on that day still persists. The daffodils are also sent to northern industrial towns.

How to spot a wild daffodil - The wild daffodil is smaller than horticultural varieties, with paler petals and a deeper yellow trumpet-like tube. The leaves are grey/green, flattened and around 15mm wide. It is relatively short (30-35cm) and forms clumps which carpet the ground. A top tip is that unless there are several hundreds of them looking particularly small and washed out, they probably aren't wild!

Please help us to map the churchyards containing wild daffodils by taking a photo on the iNaturalist app and posting it on our Beautiful Burial Grounds project within iNaturalist.

Speak up and be voted

So often diocesan synods are perceived as boring, dry and bureaucratic. This should not be the case! Rather they should exist to serve the mission of the wider Church, to make strategic decisions, and to encourage the growth of mission and ministry in our diocese. So, are you passionate about these things and want to play a more active role in embedding our vision and strategy in the life of all our churches and communities? Then please read on...

What is Diocesan Synod?

Diocesan Synod is our primary elected, representative body and brings people together across the Church of England in Staffordshire, north Shropshire and the Black Country. It holds the diocesan vision, drives mission, sets strategy, elects and appoints a range of positions on boards and committees and shapes priorities.

It may respond to questions put to it by the General Synod and is an advisory and deliberative body. It considers the important topics facing our diverse and unique diocese and the wider Church. It is a statutory institution which serves not only our diocese but influences and helps to direct the national church on matters of church, public and government policy. It also includes some mandatory governance items such as approval of the budget and the annual accounts. The membership consists of three houses: the House of Bishops; the House of Clergy; and the House of Laity.

The current three-year term is due to end on 31 July. The next synod members will be elected in the summer of 2024 and serve a term of three years. Meetings are held in March, June and November. The agenda for 2024-2027

Themes for the next three years will include embedding our diocesan vision and strategy, taking forward the Growing Faith initiative in relation to schools and families; a continuing focus on growth in numbers and depth of discipleship, including new Christians, and new worshipping communities; actively engaging with our local communities, determination to continue to focus on safeguarding, diversity, racial justice and the environment.

What skills and qualities do representatives need?

• Vision: Do you have a vision for a flourishing Church and a passion to work with others to share your Christian faith and deepen the discipleship of those around you?

• Commitment: Are you ready to seek God's will through prayer and reflection, with a heart for growth, mission and engagement across boundaries?

• Openness: Are you open to trying new approaches while learning from others, embracing change and the bigger picture and to sharing inspiring feedback with your deanery, PCC and wider church family?

• Enthusiasm: Members of Synod are encouraged to speak and challenge confidently, enabling change whilst leading and encouraging others.

• Good communication skills: Do you have a listening ear? Are you receptive and open-minded and have the ability to share your passion?

Do you have — or could you develop — some of these qualities to serve the Diocese of Lichfield? If so, can I encourage everyone reading this who is on the electoral roll of your church, is over 16 years of age and an actual communicant to prayerfully consider whether this is something God is calling you to do?

I would be happy to talk to anyone considering this and answer any questions or concerns you may have.

From the Diocese Sharing each others' gifts for the growth of the church

Lichfield Diocese was well represented at the second Intercultural Church conference, hosted this year by Bishop Martyn Snow in Leicester Diocese just before Easter.

The Anglican Network for Intercultural Churches (ANIC) was launched last year, with the hope of enhancing the capacity and understanding for effective intercultural mission.

The focus of the conference was to advocate for Racial Justice, promote global culture awareness, to champion God's great commission to all nations, and encourage rehearsals for the heavenly worship.



Among attendees were Revd Gilbert David, a member of our Racial Justice and Inclusion Task Group and Jules Smith, our Strategic Ministerial Development Officer. Revd Ray Gaston. vicar of St Chad & St Mark Wolverhampton was among the speakers and Canon Sharon Prentis (another RJITG member, Deputy Director of the C of E Racial Justice Unit and Canon Theologian at Lichfield Cathedral) gave one of the keynote talks, emphasising the importance of unity in diversity, bringing people together from different backgrounds under one roof, and sharing each others' gifts for the growth of the church.

"I personally think it was a successful conference" says Revd Gilbert "as it fully outlined and explained the goals and objectives set by the organisers. It was a good networking exercise through which people built new connections and learned many skills to help build Intercultural churches, which are now needed more than ever now that the United Kingdom has become a multi-cultural country, and people from all over the world have come here."

Bishop Tim Wambunya, the Chairman of ANIC Training and Consultancy, Intercultural Mission Events, and Affirmation for Intercultural Ministries, welcomed people from the wider Anglican Communion from around the country. The Conference was sponsored by the Racial Justice Unit of the Church of England. The Conference was hosted by the Bishop of Leicester, Bishop Martyn Snow, together with Bishop Lusa Nsenga-Ngoy, Bishop of Willesdon, and Bishop Saju Muthulay, Bishop of Loughborough. Many Intercultural Clergy and Lay leaders who are actively involved in the promotion of Intercultural Mission were invited to share their views.

The conference concluded with three Mission Actions Points which could be adopted by parishes:

- 1. To promote an environment of unity and fellowship within diverse church communities, based on biblical principles.
- 2. To encourage genuine and authentic relationships based on love, respect, and understanding, whilst challenging injustice by being intentional about it.
- 3. to promote a better understanding of intercultural community life, recognising the strengths and limitations of concepts like Communitas (the spirit of community), Ubuntu (humanity to others) and I-Thou (treating others as unique and equal), and how they might apply in Intercultural Mission.

Following the conference Regional Teams have been formed and a team has been appointed to create a training tool for the development of Intercultural Churches. The first follow-up Zoom meeting is schedule for the 10th April 2024.

Jules concludes: "This was a very insightful and deeply encouraging conference. I learnt what intercultural church could look like, as well as embracing the stories and cultures of others as Anglicans."
